




**QUEEN ALEXANDRA SOLARIUM**


to be sound and strong in limb—to play ball with the boys—to skip and run with the girls—to enjoy to the full all the wonders of beautiful British Columbia. This is what we have made possible for so many of our little patients during the past year.

Another year of hard work—inspiration—disappointments — encouragement — and most of all, accomplishment. Again we have cared for a capacity-filled hospital with outstanding results, and there remains a warmth and satisfaction as we watch these children returning home, better in body and spirit because they have received loving care and the best treatment it is possible for us to give.

This we have done—but only under great difficulties. Our buildings are outdated, inconveniently arranged for modern hospital practice, and greatly in need of replacement. These improvements have already been postponed too long, but we felt that we should not enter into competition with housing and industrial reconstruction for the available materials and manpower. The time has now come when we must make our plans for a complete new building if we are to continue our splendid record in the care and treatment of crippled children. This is a great undertaking and will take many thousands of dollars. Soon it will be necessary to launch a campaign for a new building fund, but in the meantime we must carry on, repairing and replacing where absolutely necessary. At the present time plans are being prepared for a new Nurses' Home. Staff accommodation has been crowded and inadequate for many years, and now that new regulations require a 44-hour week instead of a 48, the staff must necessarily be increased. The first requirement in restoring health to handicapped children is to have them fostered by a happy, efficient staff, and if a nurse is to be ready to give competent, patient service which is so vital in this work she must have respite during her leisure hours. This has not been possible in crowded living quarters located close enough to be affected by the hustle and bustle of the hospital. It is proposed that the new Nurses' Home shall be constructed on the southern point, beside the salt water pool, far enough away from the main building to solve this problem. When this project is completed we must begin at the earliest possible moment upon the construction of the new hospital which will provide all the necessary facilities.

Yes—this is a major undertaking. Ambitious, perhaps, but the need goes on, and we resolutely prepare ourselves to take the necessary steps to broaden and improve the scope of our work.


## *“Waiting”*


## ***“Stout Fella”***


## *“Angel Face”*

The Solarium Junior League of Victoria, for contributing the sum of \$9,500 toward Cot Maintenance, and \$5,500 toward completion of the new heating plant. 


